Sometimes, bad things happen. In the beginning of Luke 13, two different tragedies are brought to the attention of Jesus. One involves the cruelty Pontus Pilate, the other a construction accident involving an aqueduct.

Pharisees of the time would have told people that it was the sins of these people that caused them to die in these terrible ways, quoting things like Ezekiel 18, "the soul that sins shall die" to back their statement. At the same time a group of rebels, called the zealots, of whom Simon was one, (not Simon Peter, the other one,) might have said that the aqueduct workers were killed because of their "sin" of helping the Romans. Jesus addresses both of these perceptions at the same time saying that these people were no worse sinners than any of the rest of us. Sometimes bad things happen.

So if bad things are going to happen regardless, does that mean we should go through life without accepting responsibility for our own actions? Certainly not! Jesus follows up with, "But unless you repent, you too will all perish" or "unless you have a change of heart, you too will perish," and proceeds to tell them the parable of the fig tree.

Here Jesus is talking about more than our actions, but our whole mindset. When we commit to true Inward journey time we are digging around ourselves and

opening ourselves up for Christ to fertilize us. Without this fertilizer, without this connection to Christ, what kind of fruit can we hope to bear? Conversely, think of what we can accomplish in this world if we are able to soak up this unlimited well of love that Christ has shared with us.

Yes, sometimes bad things happen, but it is up to each and every one of us, with the help of God and each other, to make sure good things happen too.
