- V. **Premise 4:** Loving others is the ultimate worship (Romans 12:1)
- a. Jesus changes the conversation from God-centered to Human-centered = God-centered:
 - John Piper: "loving God is made visible and manifest and full in our visibly, practically, sacrificially loving others"
 - ii. F.B. Meyer: "Wherever there is true love, there must be giving, and giving to the point of sacrifice."
 - iii. Agape Love: "the New Testament declares agape to be the character trait around which all others revolve. The apostle John writes, 'God is love, and the one who abides in love abides in God, and God abides in him' (1John 4:16)." John MacArthur
 - Agape (agapaō) is different than phileo (fraternal love) which is emotional. Agape is by choice, not dependent on emotion, unrestrained and unconditional. (mentioned 115 times in the New Testament)
- b. How can you love others if you don't love yourself? (thank you Larry [and Pastor David]!)
 - i. "...if we truly loved ourselves we would never harm another, because if we harm another it is in some way diminishing who we are; it is taking away from rather than adding to our lives." – Sharon Salzberg (*The Kindness Handbook*, 2008)
- c. God loves you, so should you love you (John 3:16) now do the greatest thing you can do, go and love others!
